## Follow Devonport lead, says Shearwater group

OPPONENTS of a proposed Shearwater supermarket development say plans to consolidate Devonport's city centre are vindication of their concerns.

Pressure group Save Our Seaside Village says the Latrobe Council's Shearwater-Port Sorell Strategic Plan will be bad for the area.

The plan proposes a business precinct, including a supermarket, about 700 metres from the existing village business district.

Save Our Seaside Village spokesman Guy Barnett said vesterday that the council's proposal would effectively split the village business heart in two.

Mr Barnett said a Devonport City Council plan announced this month to consolidate business into one area in that city showed that the Shearwater plan was flawed.

He said Devonport had strayed from having a single business district and now saw that as a mistake.

water last month voted overwhelmingly to reject the Shearwater strategic plan and called for a parliamentary inquiry (which has been backed by the Greens) and for more information on development plans for the new area.

He said a Latrobe Council regulation from 2008 limited growth on existing businesses to 250 square metres per business, but this would not apply to businesses in the new area. which was anti-competitive.
